What will you do during your Music A-Level?

Component 1: Appraising 40% of the qualification 100 marks • Written Examination: 2 Hours	 Content overview: Knowledge and understanding of musical elements, contexts and language. Application of knowledge through the context of six areas of study, each with three set works. Vocal Music, Instrumental Music, Music for Film, Popular Music and Jazz, Fusions, New Directions.

 Component 2: Composing 30% of the qualification 60 marks Non-examined assessment: externally assessed Total of two compositions, one to a brief set by Pearson and one either free composition or also to a brief. 	 Content overview: One composition must be from either a list of briefs related to the areas of study, or a free composition, carrying 40 marks for this component. This composition must be at least four minutes in duration. One composition must be from a list of briefs assessing compositional technique, carrying 20 marks for this component. This component. This composition must be at least be at least one minute in duration, unless the brief specifies a longer minimum duration. Total time across both submissions must be a minimum of six minutes
 Component 3: Performing 30% of the qualification 60 marks Non-examined assessment: externally assessed A public performance of one or more pieces, performed as a recital. 	 Content overview: Performance can be playing or singing solo, in an ensemble, improvising, or realising music using music technology. The total performance time across all pieces must be a minimum of eight minutes. Performances must be recorded after 1 March in the year of certification and all materials for assessment submitted to arrive by 15 May in the year of certification.

We expect for you to demonstrate a positive behaviour and proper attitude, put maximum effort, respect rules, be highly organised and punctual, use a wide range of resources, and revise thoroughly on a regular basis.

Summer Bridging Work- ESSENTIAL

1. Familiarise yourself with the 18 Set Works that will be studied throughout the course. These are easily found online (see YouTube playlist in the 'recommended websites' section). Listen to them as much as possible - it

will benefit you greatly to have a firm grasp of what the each of the set works <u>sound</u> like before analysing them in September.

- 2. The expected level at which you are expected to be able to perform at in the first year of the course is Grade 7. Pick a piece to work on at home in preparation for a short performance in September.
- 3. Compose a short piece of music (min 1-minute) in a style of your choice. You may use computer software and you may present your composition in any format you like.

Summer Bridging Work- RECOMMENDED

- 1. Once you have familiarised yourself with the 18 set works, it is recommended that you try to familiarise yourself with some 'wider listening'. You can find some excellent examples here:
