# Subject Course: Sociology

### What do you do in your first year?

## Summer Bridging Work- ESSENTIAL

During year 12 you will be expected to complete several essays beyond the classroom. The first topic you will study is Families & Households (analysing the position of men, women and children in the family).

You must complete the following tasks before starting the course:

Research topic question: Is the position of men and women in the family equal?

The <u>Division of labour</u> refers to the roles that men and women occupy within the family. Many types of division of labour exist and have changed over time.

Task 1: Research the following types of division of labour and complete the table.

**Find out the following:** What are the definitions for each type of division of labour? Research either statistical evidence or sociological research that supports each type of division of labour - the evidence does not need to be recent. Create a table as seen below:

Task 2: Write <u>two statements</u>; for and against the question "<u>Is the position of men and women in the family equal?"</u> You must include <u>evidence</u> to support your points, the <u>definitions</u> researched above and <u>your own point of view.</u> Each statement (for and against the question) should be at least <u>one side of A4.</u>

You can also use <u>newspaper articles</u> to support your statements e.g. which gender is more likely to carry out domestic work? Childcare? Or paid employment? Does this suggest the family is or is not equal?

### Task 3: Research project on the historical background of key sociologists

A sociologist is a person who studies people's social lives, activities and behaviours. You are going to research the sociologists below. I want you to find out the historical background of each of the sociologists below and answer the questions that follow for each sociologist.

#### Success criteria:

- A) What era where they writing in?
- B) Any famous books/ work they have published/ studies conducted
- C) What or who influenced them to think the way they did
- D) Is their work outdated today? Explain.

Task 4: Now that you are aware of some of the sociologists that exist. You are going to research theoretical/ sociological perspectives. A theoretical/ sociological perspective offers an explanation of how society runs, functions and why it is structured in a particular manner.

#### Success criteria:

- A) Provide a summary of the theory.
- B) Identify the sociologists that support the theory e.g Marxism Karl Marx.
- C) What is the theories viewpoint on the family? What functions does the family perform according to the theory? e.g Marxism argued that the function of the family is to serve capital- how?

For each theory below make sure you cover one A4 page:

- 1. Marxism
- 2. Functionalism
- 3. Radical Feminism
- 4. Liberal Feminist
- 5. Marxist Feminist
- 6. New right theory
- 7. Postmodernist theory
