

# Example of an Autumn Term Year 7 Academic Progress Report

As with all reports there is a comment on the student's attendance and achievement and behaviour points.

Students will be given a BMAT KS3 level in all of the subjects they study. This indicates the level at which they are currently working in each subject.

The initial BMAT levels entered for Year 7 are based on the first half term of work and are indicative of students' current attainment. As such students are given a full BMAT level.

The next report will contain a fine level e.g. Level 3a rather than Level 3.

As with all reports there is a comment on the student's attendance and achievement/behaviour points.

As with the spring term academic progress report, students will be given a BMAT KS3 level in all of the subjects they study. This indicates the level at which they are currently working in each subject.

'A' following a level i.e. level 4A = the student is achieving at the top end of this level.  
 'B' following a level i.e. level 4B = the student is secure at this level.  
 'C' following a level i.e. level 4C = the student is achieving at the bottom end of this level.

There is a letter following the level. A level followed by an A e.g. Level 4A indicates that a student is at the top of that level, e.g. a high Level 4. A level followed by a C, e.g. Level 4C indicates that a student is at the lower end of that descriptor, e.g. a low Level 4.

The progress indicator colour coding system shows whether a student is working above, on or below target based on their personal end of KS5 target grade.
